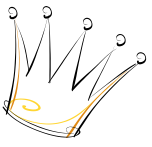

Costumes

- All Other Boys:** Should look like a peasant. Colorful shirt with colorful sweatpants rolled up the knee with long colorful knee socks. Plus a cap or hat and one or all three of the following: vest, tie, suspenders.
